

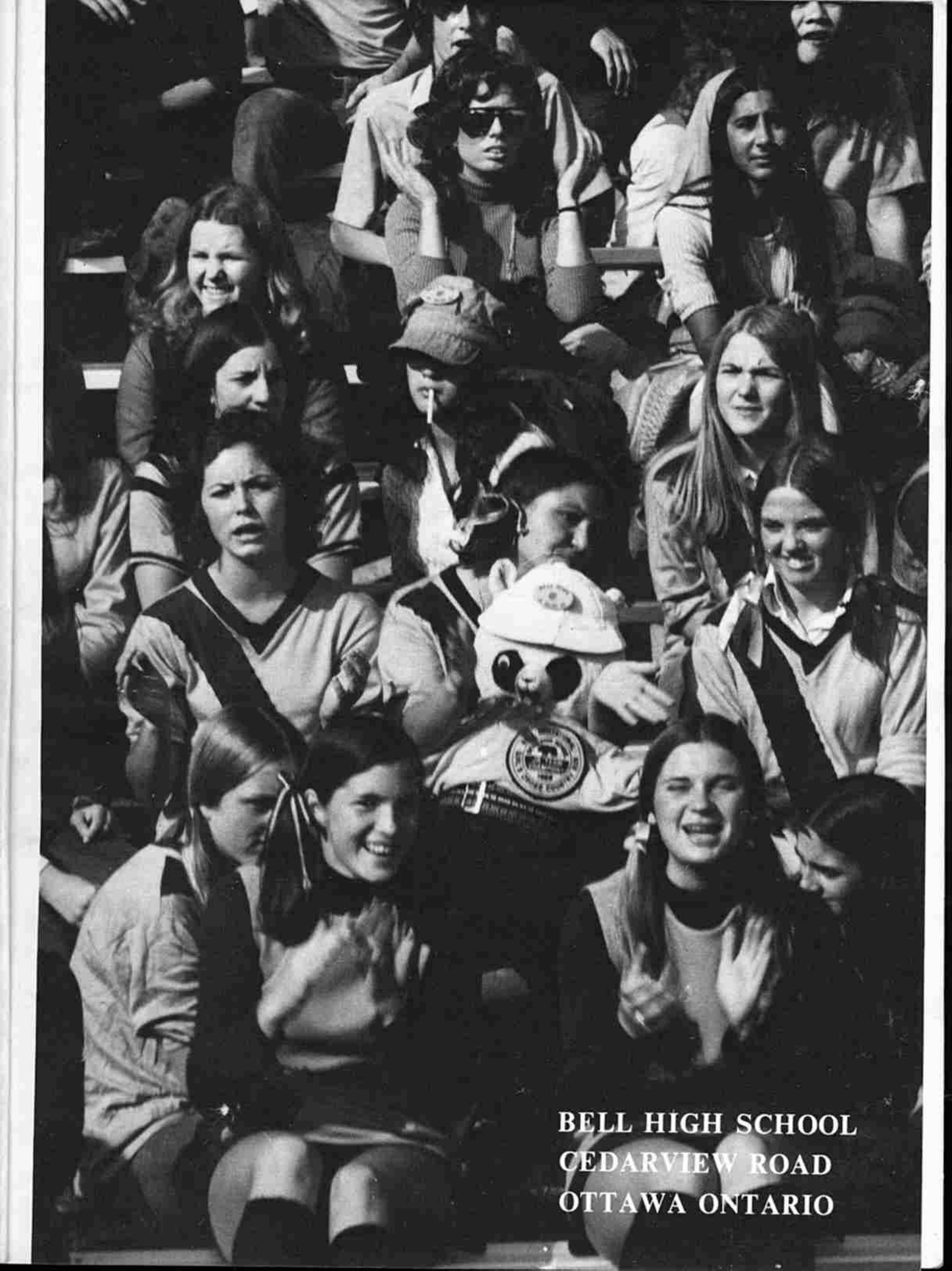

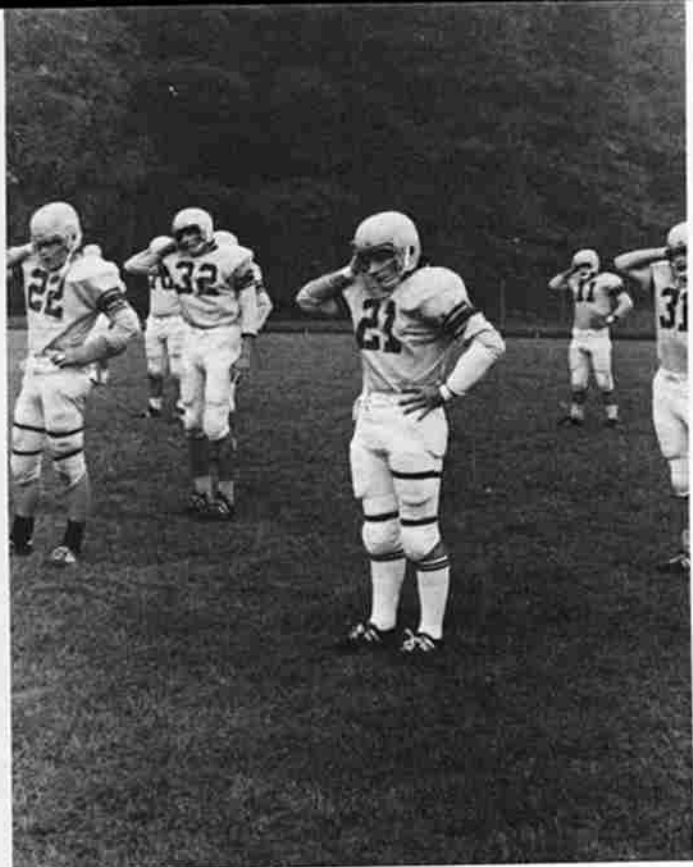

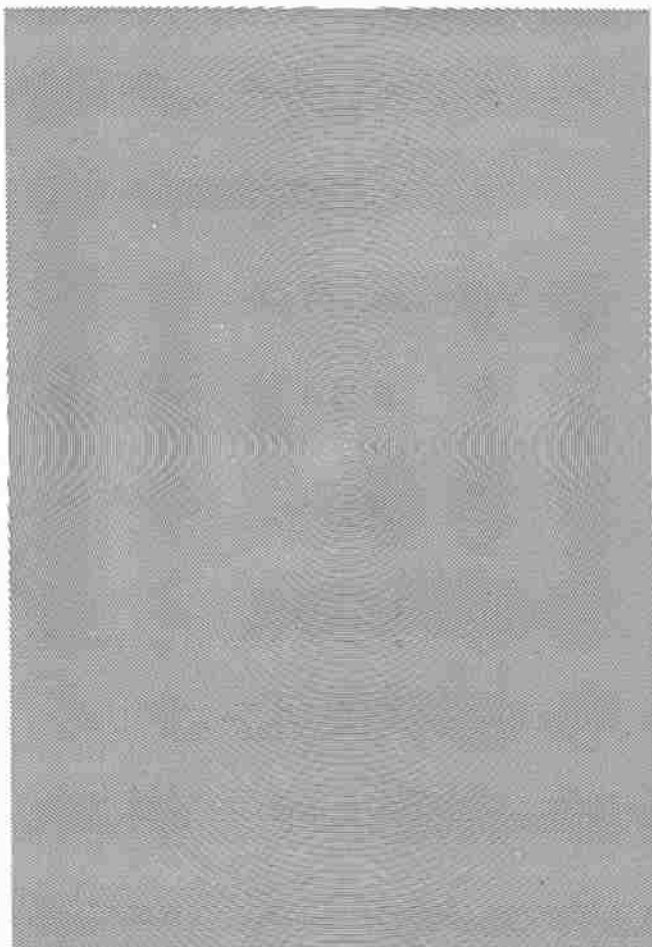
The Principal's Message

The Vice-Principal's Message

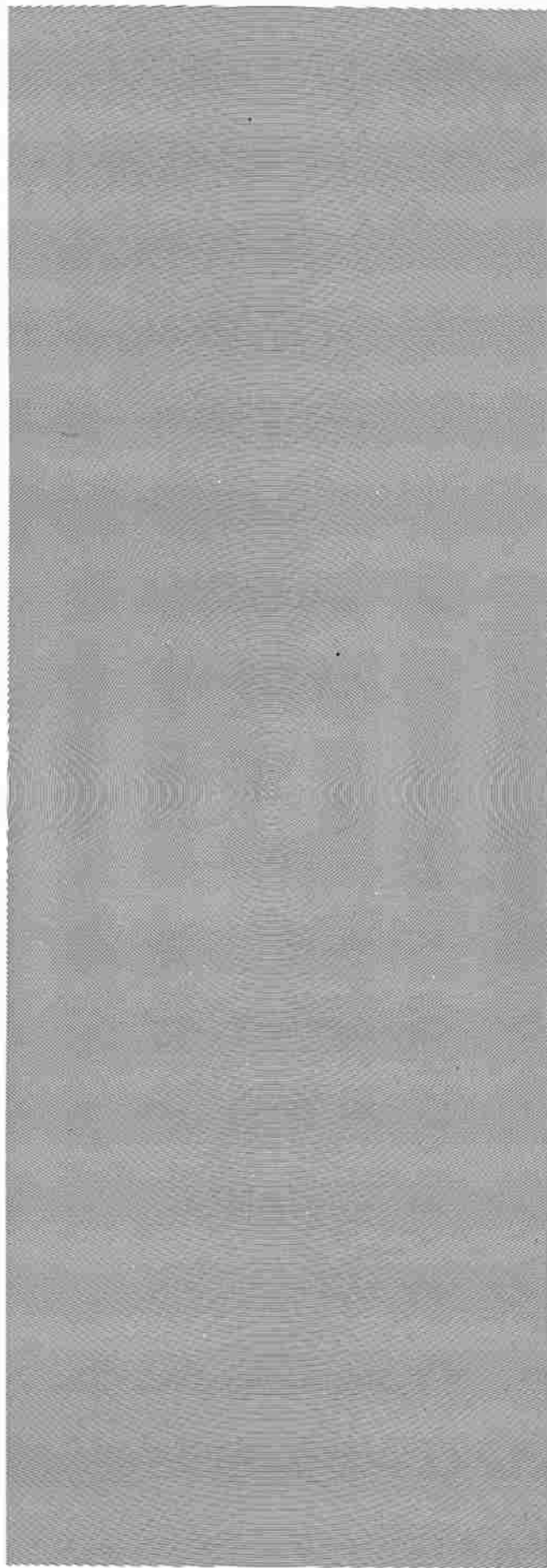
We have just completed another busy and successful year at Bell.

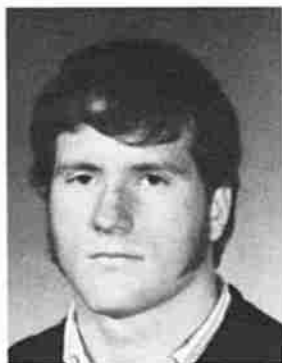
Brenda Buchanan 13F

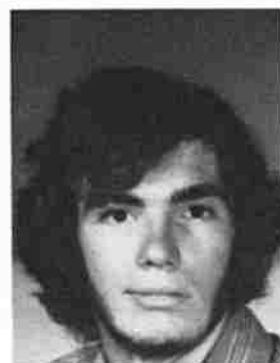


Debbie Comber 13B

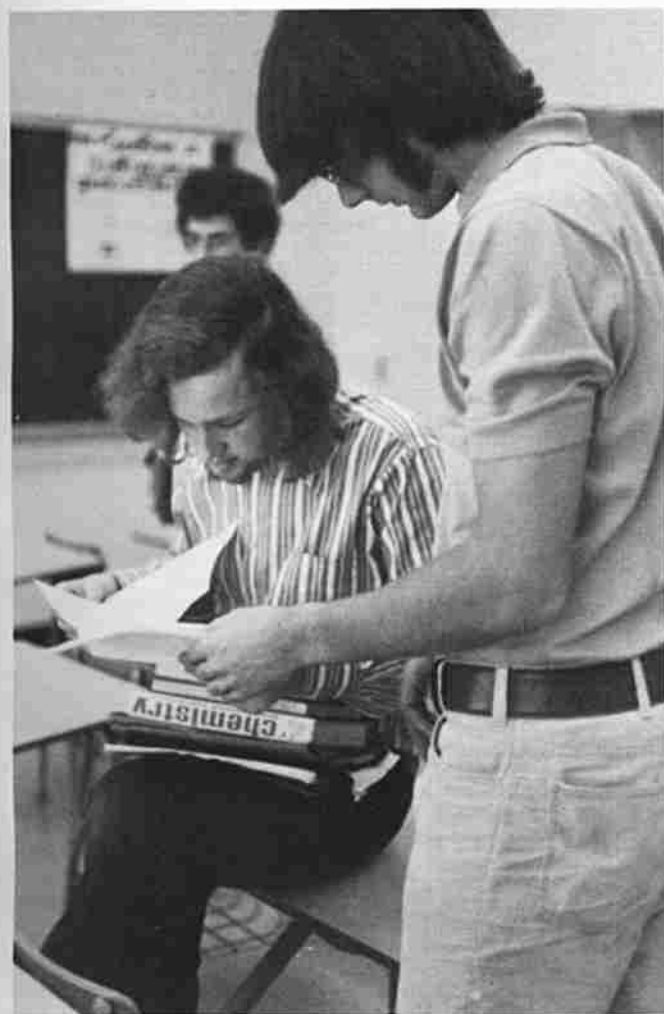




Norman Desjardins 13F

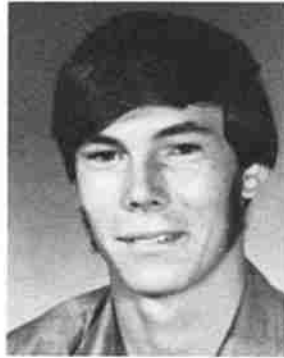


Els Hilkes 13D

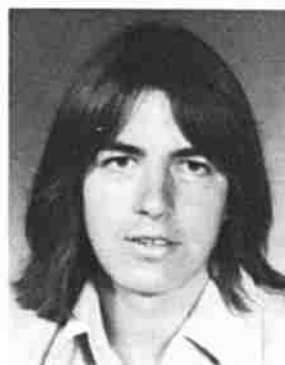

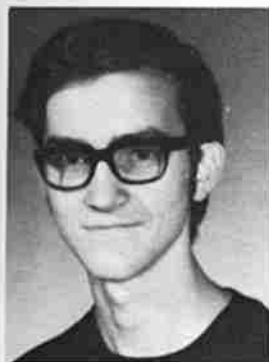
Ian Macdonald 13A

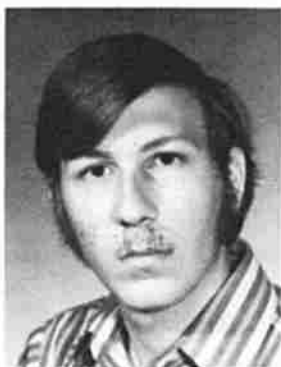
Kenneth John Ironside Mackay 13B

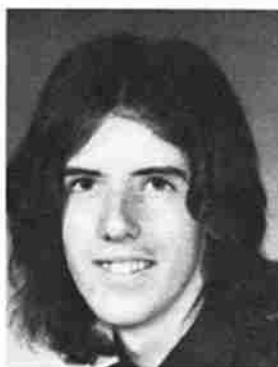
Michael McCarthy 13D

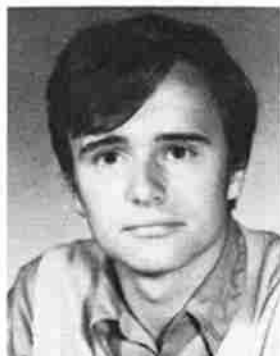


Harry Middleman 13C

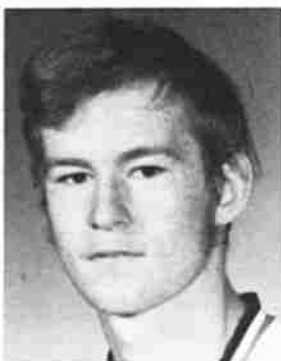
Katherine Phillips 13B

Philosophy on life - well, do your own thing while you can; there are times when you won't be able to.

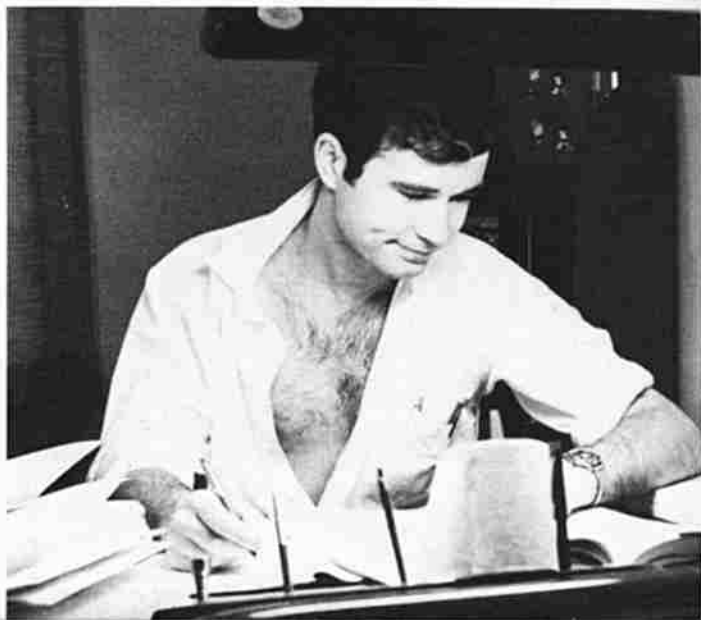
Am I achieving my ambitions? So far, yes, but there's a lot more I still want to do.

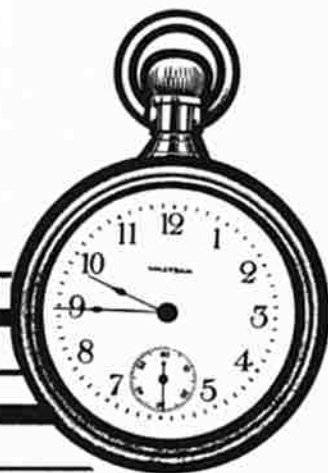
Clockflesh

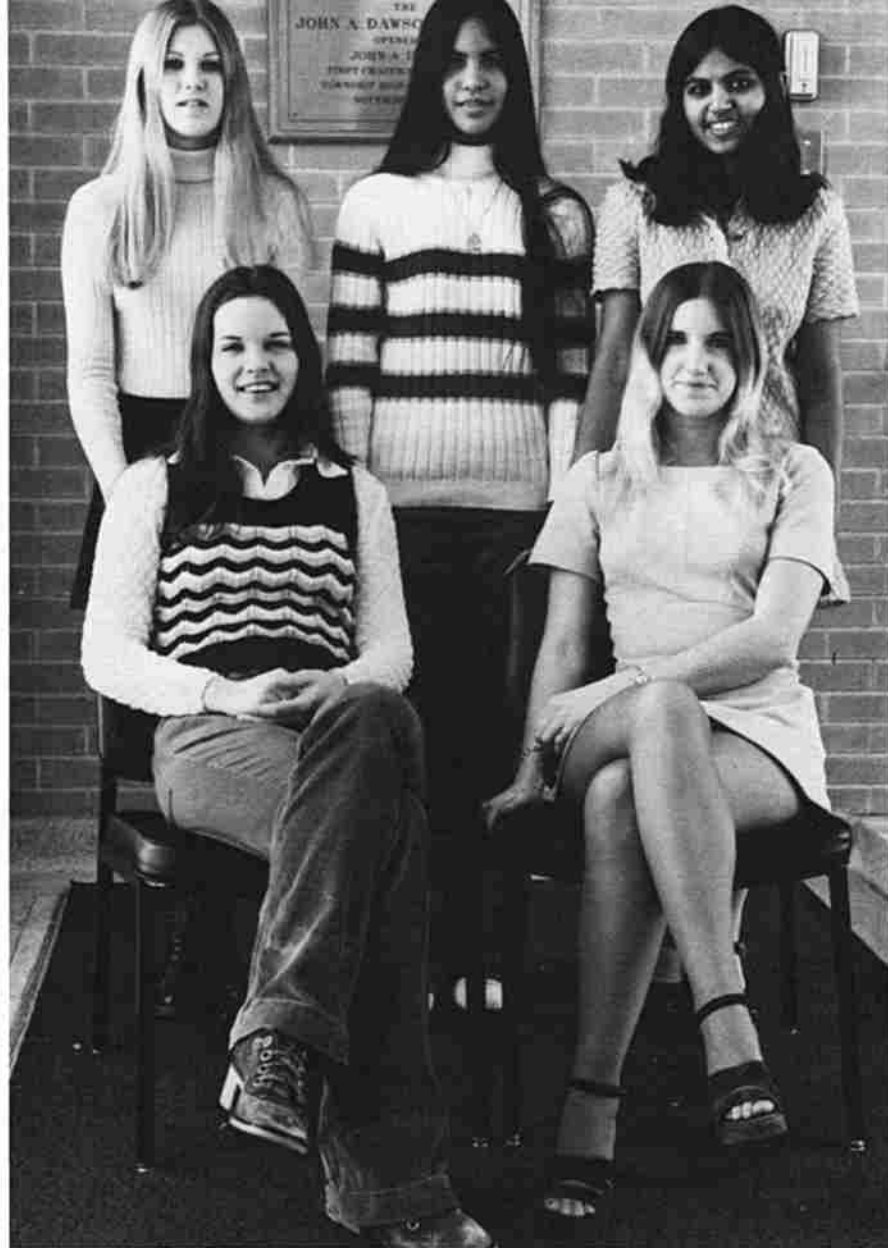
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SNOW QUEEN '72
