The seniors were defeated early in the season by Borden and Confederation as a result of several fumbles on punt returns.


The team did not give up. In the second last game they defeated Confederation 13-6 in the best game of the year.

Bruins Win

City Championship

This year Bell had the best year in hockey since 1968. To a strong nucleus of players from last year, we added six new players and came up with a well-balanced attack.

From the beginning of the year we had confidence that this was going to be the year to take the city finals. We decided to find out early where the really tough opposition was going to be. From the exhibition season we saw that this opposition was going to be Sir Wilfred Laurier or Ridgemont.

Up until Christmas, we had played 12 games and were leading in the western division.

During the Christmas holidays the team travelled to Sudbury for the National Hockey Tournament. There were teams from New Brunswick, Manitoba, Quebec, Ottawa, North Bay and Sudbury. Unfortunately, we had to play the strongest team the same night as our arrival - after bouncing all the way up to Sudbury. We lost what was basically a 4 - 3 game, 6 - 3 to Copper Cliff, the first night out.

After that, there was no looking back. We beat Lo-Ellen Park of Sudbury 8 - 3, then Lockerby, also from Sudbury, 8 - 1 for the

consolation cup. The entire team was thrilled with the tournament: the billets were excellent, the fans and coaches very sporting. The whole affair was first class.

After Christmas, we had 11 league games of which we won 10 and tied 1. On Saturday, January 8th, we travelled to St. Lawrence University in Canton, New York. Although they were wonderful social hosts, they handed us our worst defeat, 7 - 0. The experience was invaluable, however, as we gained an appreciation of the U.S. college wide-open and fast-skating type of hockey.

The second game was a cliff-hangar. With Bell leading 1 - 0 with ten minutes to go in the third period Sir Wil got two quick goals and the whole tone of the game had changed. We pulled Bill Allen out of his "home base" and they drove "one" into the empty net. The game ended 3 - 1 for Sir Wilfred Laurier.

However, defeat did not hang lightly on the shoulders of the Bell Bruins. The final game was never in doubt. Gord Porter went out and scored the first three goals, and just before the end of the first period Doug Grills "deked" the goalie for the winner. At the end of the second period it was 6 - 1 on goals by Ron Carkner and Kyle Smith. We won 6 - 3.






