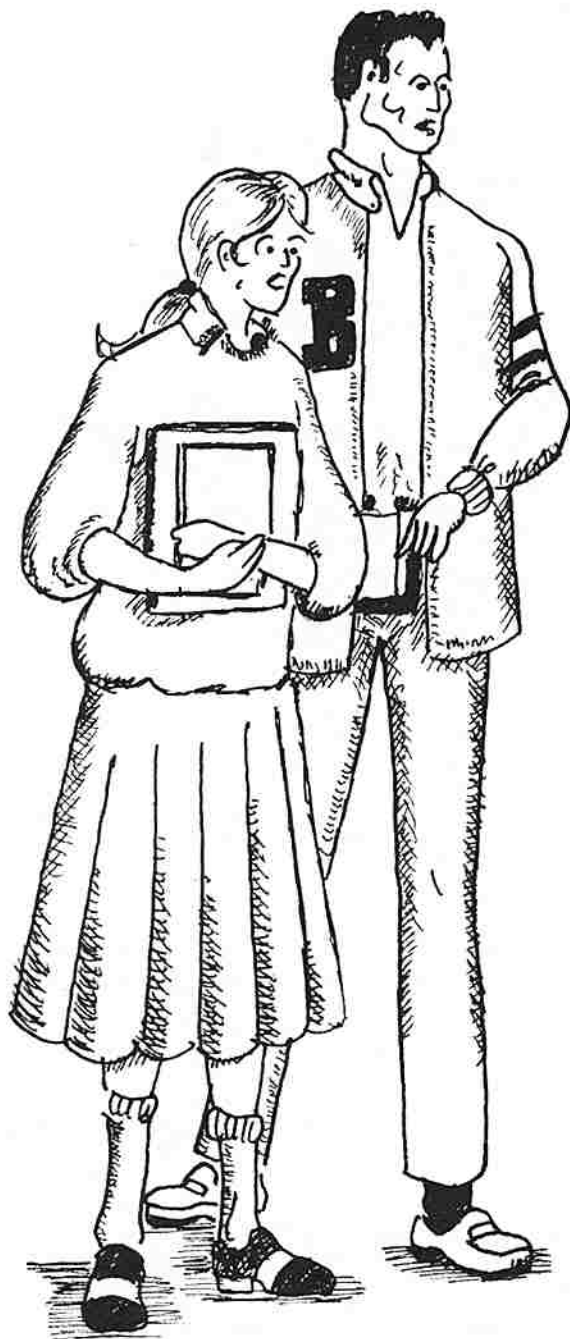

Bell High School has now existed for ten years, and this seems a length of time appropriate for an institution to develop traditions and a certain status in the community.

The only absolute truth about any school is that it is a very impermanent place for the people who pass through it. Only half a dozen or so of the original teachers remain, for the decade of the 1960's was a time when teachers moved freely from school to school and promotions were relatively quick. The school bears the mark of many innovative and hard-working teachers, some of whom have gone on to distinguished careers.

Of the original group of students who were dragged away from Woodroffe, Nepean and other older high schools, many are university graduates, a few nearing the end of their doctoral studies. Many are married and have families and it will not be long before we begin to receive the second generation of students. Quite a gratifying number have become teachers, which may demonstrate that they found some inspiration here.

In 1962, Lynwood Village was a daringly modern suburb, really quite far out in the country, and its neighborhood high school was thought to be very grand. No one would have believed then that six more high schools would be built in the county in the following decade and that Bell would be thought of as a kind of Senior Citizen among schools so soon. Schools age, just as people do, and it is a tribute to those who have served as trustees and administrators that the school is so well maintained and supplied with the best equipment available.

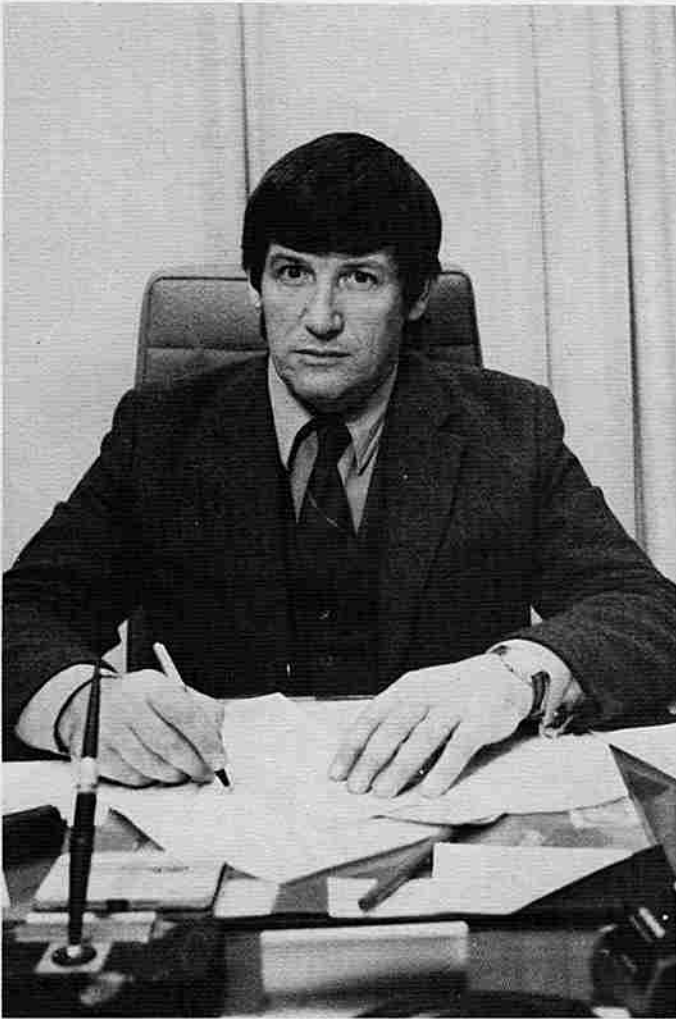
The Bell community has always expected a great deal from its institutions and has always been willing to



contribute generously in time and money to make them run well. At various times the school has served as a church, a community meeting place, a night school and a place of recreation. It could do much more along these lines and hopefully it will do so in its next decade.

Finally, the outstanding impression one gets in working at Bell is that there is great good will among the students, graduates and the parents. Everyone wants to be part of a school with good academic standards and with an atmosphere of friendly co-operation and effort. The staff is dedicated to those goals and the students do their share towards the creation of a good school community.
