
CLASSES OUT TO BAISE MONEY

Sorry Page Missing Posted In P.2. dotted with craters and mountains, the maria are relatively flat and smooth and are similar in appearance to deserts, though they are not covered with send. It is the smooth, flat nature of the maria which makes them of current interest: they are ideal landing areas for future astronauts. The maria are best seen at the time of full Moon , the craters at first or last

quarter.

The five maria on the west side of the Moon are all rather small and, with the exception of Mare Crisium, tend to blend together to form one system. Mare Crisium, being from the others, is easy to distinguish by eye. Mare Crisium, being separated covered by craters on the west side of the Moon is much larger than the area coveredby the maria. On the east side, the area of the maria is greater than that of the craters and mountains. Near the north lunar pole is Mare Imbrium, thought to be the

near the north lunar pole is mare imprium, thought to be the youngest (most recently formed) of the maria and to have been formed by the impact and explosion of an asteroid.

Oceanus Procelarum (Ocean of Storms) is the largest of the maria. It is of special interest because the American Surveyorl, Russian Luna 9, and several other Russian space craft are sitting near its eastern border. with the spirit world. This may be a sixth sense.


This sixth sense may be a hangover from when wen was more primitive, but all his senses were more sharp than they are now. Because so little is known about this sense many people do not believe in it.
